Distracted driving and driving under the influence have, unfortunately, led to the loss of multiple lives this year, with many residents upset (and rightfully so) at the perceived "inaction" by community leaders or the lack of "immediate solutions" by the City of Sacramento. Rest assured, HPNA and the surrounding neighborhood associations have convened a community-led effort on traffic

safety with the goal of providing both short and long-term solutions to the City. More details on this effort can be found on the cover of this newsletter and I encourage everyone interested to provide their input on this important issue.





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

Updates from Councilmember Jay Schenirer



As school starts, whether you have kids in a neighborhood school, or whether you walk, bike, take transit, or drive to school, please

continue to be focused on the road, or aware of cars and hazards around you if you are a pedestrian. We are often in a hurry to get to work, school, or home, and back, and too often other drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists are not paying enough attention. Traffic crashes are more than simply "accidents," but instead preventable incidents that can and must be systematically addressed - by education, enforcement, and infrastructure.

More than adding stop signs, speed

bumps, and traffic circles where cars need to slow down, the City's Vision Zero approach is an awareness of everyone on the streets, bike lanes, and sidewalks—an awareness that we have to slow down, be aware of our surroundings, and watch out for each other. In addition, our police officers have been enforcing traffic laws and conducting sobriety checkpoints, and there are far too many violations than are comfortable for me.

In Hollywood Park, we know this all too well. In August, there was one fatal collision of a neighbor on Meer Way (at Staggs), and another collision later that week on Irvin and Alma – both caused by drivers under the influence.

This week, the Council adopted two things to move forward on preventing these accidents:

- Vision Zero Action Plan (https://bit.ly/2MtDHTN)
- Bicycle Master Plan
 Implementation Plan(<u>https://bit.</u>
 <u>ly/2MWeKgG</u>)

What do these two plans mean? First

– a commitment to safety and to invest
in areas that have the greatest need for
better infrastructure and enforcement.

The most expensive item to address traffic signals and crossing
infrastructure - is forthcoming. Yet
there is a lot of need across the City
and the Bicycle Master Plan helps
address important bicycle
infrastructure and intersections that
we must improve to support bicyclists
(and indirectly pedestrians and
drivers).

On major arterials like Freeport and Fruitridge, the number of incidents still don't justify the immediate short-term needs – especially with other areas throughout the City with higher collision rates and more dangerous intersections.

Despite that, I know we will continue to hear from residents about traffic safety needs and continue to work with our traffic engineering department to monitor intersections and speeds. We've been working with neighborhood schools to make sure parents are slowing down as they drop off and pick up kids, and that residents are aware of what they can do to support our Vision Zero efforts. If you want any Vision Zero yard signs call my office!

In the News: Stacia Way, 1950

A slice of life in early Hollywood Park, from the archives of the Sacramento Bee.

5/19/50

Warren R. Coffeen, of 2100 Stacia
Way, is serving on the organizing
committee for the upcoming
Scouting Exposition at Cal Expoexpected to be one of the largest to
date. Ninety-three Cub packs, Boy
Scout troops, and Explorer posts will
converge on the Machinery Building
on May 20th to participate in workshops and present exhibits on a
variety of related topics, including:
camp craft, woodsmanship,
indian lore, hobby skills, and
vocational training.

Owner of a local insurance agency for over 15 years, Coffeen and family relocated from Illinois to Sacramento in 1945. As a soldier during World War II, he did radio work and helped produce plays in military hospitals. Both Warren and wife Evelyn were highly active in local service and social organizations, and the former

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was both a 33rd degree Mason and leader of the local Scottish Rite Temple. 9/12/50

12/2/50

The County of Sacramento approved a \$579,600 building permit for the expansion of the Hollywood Park School, 2241 Stacia Way. The project will include the construction of 19 classrooms, an administrative building, multipurpose room, two kindergartens, home economics unit, shop, band room, and library. The additions were designed by architects Koblick and Fischer, and construction will be overseen by contractor Charles Unger. Evidence of just how rapidly the neighborhood was growing at the time. The original incarnation of Hollywood Park Elementary, which had opened just over a year prior, contained only 6 classrooms in two wings. Six years later, the site would be converted to Joaquin Miller Junior High (today's Leonardo Da Vinci School), and the elementary school would relocate to new digs at its current location on Harte Way. Koblick and Fisher were prolific designers of local school campuses--including parts of UC

12/9/50

A Los Angeles man was killed -- and his passenger seriously injured -when he swerved to avoid a loose tire and veered into the path of both a semi-truck and Greyhound bus on the opposite side of the Yolo Causeway. The victims collided with the Pacific Trucking Company auto transport vehicle, while the bus avoided all but the tire. Bus driver Glenn F. Lane of 2153 Stacia Way, all of his passengers, and the truck driver were uninjured in the accident. In 1965, Lane would be honored by Greyhound for more than 20 years of accident-free driving--an estimated 1.5 million miles.

Baby Trees are Coming!

Have you the noticed the multi-colored lawn signs popping up around the neighborhood? On November 10th, each of those lawn signs will be replaced with a young shade tree in what the CommuniTree Committee hopes will be the first annual community day of planting. In partnership with the Sacramento Tree Foundation and the Hollywood Park Neighborhood Association, 6 neighbors have been working to bring free tree related workshops and community events to the neighborhood. For their shade, air filtering ability, and curb appeal, a tree is a valuable addition to many homes. Unfortunately, many people don't know how to care for their existing trees and, living in a city known for its dense urban

forest, it can be easy to take for granted the benefits of a tree. The workshops and community events provided by this partnership are an effort to help people love, understand, and appreciate trees.

Whether you are interested in planting a new tree or caring for an existing one, the CommuniTree committee hopes that you will join us and your neighbors in welcoming the new trees.

Water Wise Tree Care Review

On July 21st, Pam Sanchez from the Sacramento Tree Foundation talked with a group of community members about the best way to care for mature trees during the hot summer months. Due to technical difficulties with the projector, she used a printed hand out. This happy accident led to a format that was

more like a conversation in which she addressed general tree care concerns and also answered specific questions. A few key notes from the presentation are: thick mulch (about 5") provides good insulation for the trees and helps to maintain the soil health, trees benefit most from slow, deep watering that can be produced by a soaker hose, and tree roots that drink water and take in nutrients are much further from the base of the tree than folks think. In general, the roots grow with the leafy canopy of the tree; watering near the trunk is not the best way to care for the tree.

Save the CommuniTree Committee

In October 2017, Cassandra Shahani from HPNA and Torin Dunnavant from the Sacramento Tree Foundation hosted a listening session to learn about the community's interest in trees and to establish a baseline for learning opportunities. In April 2018, Irene Wilson, Claire Bromond, Kathleen Taylor, Ellynrose Sheehan, and Russ Schmunk joined Cassandra and Torin to form the CommuniTree committee. Over the past year, everyone has worked to provide free workshops and tree-oriented community events. We received grant funding from our councilman's office as well as funding from the County. With the funding and people power available, the Committee is able to provide micro-grants to help individuals remove sick and dead trees, host more targeted community workshops, and find new and innovative ways to improve the shade canopy in our neighborhood. Unfortunately, the committee may disband. At the end of December 2018, Cassandra will step down from her leadership role and, presently, there is not another person interested in taking over. Though committee members will likely remain engaged, a person is needed to be the primary point of contact for the Sacramento Tree Foundation and the community. Responsibilities include: planning and hosting monthly steering committee meetings, working with local businesses to provide space for workshops and community events, doing outreach to the community for events and workshops, developing a calendar of events for the year, maintaining the webpage, and establishing eligibility criteria and application methods for micro-grants. Neighbor Spotlight: Danny Reynoso

Danny Reynoso loves living in Hollywood Park.

After three years in Hollywood Park, Danny reflects on the benefits of the neighborhood that people may take for granted. He enjoys feeling safe when he walks his dog, being on a first-name basis with neighbors, and walking to great restaurants or riding a bike to get a beer or cider. He's "blown away by the sense of community, the friendliness, the safety, and the beauty of my neighborhood."

To promote neighborhood well-being, Danny and his wife shop at local businesses, host a front yard party during the Neighborhood Night Out, attend HPNA meetings, and, of course, always pick up their dogs' poop during walks. He also designed the front of the CommuniTree Committee's recent outreach postcard. Formerly residents of a neighborhood in decline, Danny and his wife often find themselves saying out loud "Remember when we couldn't do stuff like this?" or "I love our neighborhood."

Danny's community mindset doesn't stop in the neighborhood. In May of 2017, Danny was diagnosed with an Acoustic Neuroma, a benign brain tumor that can be fatal if left untreated. This condition is very rare and is treated with radiation. For clarity, the tumor isn't cancerous and the radiation isn't chemotherapy but the condition is serious and hard to "fully come to grips with". To process what is happening to him, Danny posts video blogs and stories that document his brain tumor journey on his website: BrainTumorFighter.com. Through the site, he has connected with brain tumor fighters from all over the world. Danny also makes t-shirts that he sells to raise money for the Acoustic Neuroma Association and to increase awareness for brain health and brain tumor research.



In May of 2018, he underwent radiation treatments to stop the tumor from growing.

When he's not fighting brain tumors, Danny shreds on his guitar with the Moans, his fun, high-energy band styled after The Ramones. He also works with a local wrestling group called Supreme Pro Wrestling.

Since I moved to Sacramento about 12 years ago, I've been on the lookout for arts and crafts classes and workshops to fulfill my passion for crafting. I've found some wonderful places with an interesting array of classes; for adults and children alike. Here are some locations to check out:

For anyone who wants to get crafty right away, here's a simple, kid-friendly Fall art project:

Create marbled leaves with shaving cream:

- 1) Spread shaving cream (foam not gel) all over a pan or tray. Next, squirt some acrylic paint, poster paint, or food coloring on the shaving cream.
- 2) Use a spoon, popsicle stick, or toothpick to swirl (but not too much) to create a marbled effect.
- 3) Trace a maple leaf template onto cardstock (like the one to the right) and then cut it out. Gently press the leaf into the shaving cream and let it sit for 10 seconds.



- 4) Remove the leaves and sit them onto paper towels for about five minutes to let the paint soak into the paper.
- 5) Now here is the cool part- using a squeegee, carefully scrape the shaving cream off of the paper leaf. Look at the awesome marbled effect it left behind!
