Neighborhood Hero: Irene Wilson

Holiday Bows, Tree Canopies Among Gifts Activist Brings to Hollywood Park



When Irene Wilson moved to Stover Way in Hollywood Park in 1996, she was immediately struck by the friendliness of her neighbors. She loved all the big trees and the birds, especially the mockingbirds.

When she discovered the mistletoe was killing area trees she joined Hollywood Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA) and started a campaign to prune out the mistletoe. This led to creating the Neighborhood Improvement Committee which she and the late Pat Pederson co-chaired. They also organized the Red Bow Holiday Project, Annual Plant Sale, House Decorating contests and other activities. As a current member of the CommuniTree Committee she has been active in the planting of more trees in Hollywood Park.

In 2010 she married Mike Kubota, her long-time ballroom dance partner. They share many other interests including: traveling, stream fishing in the Sierras and gardening. Mike just planted over 100 snap pea plants and Irene is trying her hand at propagating blueberries and fig trees. They are both retired and look forward to many years of community involvement with their neighbors and friends.



Sowing Solidarity Farm Becomes Table Farm

I volunteered with Sowing Solidarity (SS) over the last year. When their Executive Director and farmer/founder, Gina Anderson, moved out of California earlier this spring, we began conversations about transferring the lease of the farm from SS to The Table, a progressive community of faith in East Sacramento (where I work as the pastoral apprentice). The Table had been planning to launch a sourdough bread social enterprise, and was thrilled to expand this food ministry to include continuing the good work of Gina at the farm.

Over the summer, a few other volunteers from Hollywood Park and myself volunteered at the farm, donating the majority of produce to the South Sac Interfaith Partnership Food Closet (about 0.6 miles from the farm at Anita and 23rd), and doing pre-order sales of flowers and produce to the neighborhood when possible.

The lease officially transferred to The Table in mid-August. Since then, we've been coordinating three volunteer shifts a week (all are welcome, register at thetable.farm), continuing produce donations, and preparing the farm for fall/winter. We are experimenting with some fall crops with hopes to do some additional sales, but either way, we will be planting cover crop soon to rejuvenate the soil for next year.

We are so excited to be a part of this vision that Gina and neighbors began about three years ago. Real Estate Market Is Red Hot

“As motivated buyers continue to take advantage of the lowest interest rates in history, home sales will be elevated in the next couple of months, and the housing market should remain a bright spot in a broader economy that continues to struggle,” said California Association of Realtors (C.A.R.) President Jeanne Radsick. “And with many employers allowing the flexibility of working remotely, homebuyers now also have the option of searching in less expensive areas where homes are more affordable and buyers can get more home for their money.”

This 2 bedroom, 1.5 bath home (1,474 sq. ft.) at 5416 Salvator Way was on the market for \$458,280. After only four days on the market, it had four buyers and went over the asking price.

This outcome for the real estate market is surprising considering the March 2020 outbreak of COVID-19. And yet, we're experiencing a sizzling market, almost as strong as Sacramento's past summer. Typically, the market begins to slow starting in September, but it's not the case this year. Houses still sold very quickly. Data from C.A.R. indicates houses are on the market five days less than last year at just 7 days! This leads to an extremely low inventory, a 55% drop from last year.

当我们回首三月份疫情刚爆发时，估计没有人会想到如今房屋市场的状况。我们正在经历历史上最火热的市场，如同这个夏天。通常情况下，每年9月份开始房屋市场销售速度会减慢，但今年的情况会不太相同。房屋买卖仍然以不可思议的速度进行着。加州房地产经纪协会的数据显示萨克拉门托地区的房屋销售时间中位数仅有7天，而去年同期是12天。这也导致了房屋库存极低，与去年相比降低了55%，这对房屋市场上升的势头可能是一个打击。

It's the seller's market. When the inventory is so low, it often drives buyers into bidding wars, especially on homes priced below \$350,000.

I don't think anyone expected 2020 to be like this, but here we are, almost to 2021. Between COVID-19, wildfires, heat waves, and other natural disasters, plus the added impacts of racial unrest and community calls to address racism, and a presidential election, and state and local elections, there would be a lot happening. Regardless of this very different year, I am thankful to be your elected representative on the City Council.

The work at City Hall (from home) never seems to stop, but I wanted to acknowledge and thank our essential City employees who continue to keep this city going, all while juggling the uncertainty of a pandemic. In particular: our public works and solid waste staff (yay claw!); our youth parks and community enrichment staff—who've pivoted from 4th R services, programs and special events to essential worker childcare and meal delivery; and our public safety officers, emergency services team, and especially those who support our new Office of Community Response—non-law enforcement activities that serve the critical need to support our unhoused population, violence prevention offices, and mental health approaches to community needs.

I am proud that the City has been able to provide \$89 million in emergency relief to individuals, families, small businesses and nonprofits, those finding themselves in need of emergency food, rental and utilities assistance, access to internet, health services, job training opportunities, and more, in addition to personal protective equipment and community access to COVID testing. Although Federal CARES funds are only available through the end of this year there are still lots of resources available for individuals, families, and businesses at sacramentocovidrelief.org.

During this shelter-in-place, I am even more thankful for life in Sacramento and proud of Hollywood Park, as you've stepped up to support each other and be neighborly and safe. Thanks to those in the neighborhood who have made summer staycations, holidays, and other safe activities a lot of fun. Many of us have gotten to know our neighborhoods, and neighbors much better—because it has become your office, gym, social activity, school, and home. I've never seen the local hardware store so busy! As we get into the colder months, please take the time to continue to look in after your neighbors, support your local businesses, and be kind to each other.

Neighborhood Hero: Victor Vasquez

Getting You Your Newsletter in Print

From the hub of a bike wheel radiates many spokes. Like that hub, the volunteer work of one Hollywood Park resident, Victor Vasquez, powers the labor of as many as 40 other volunteers to distribute the quarterly newsletter, the *Hollywood Park Herald*.

For the last four years, Victor has volunteered with the Hollywood Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA) as the distribution manager of its newsletter. Come December, March, June and September, Victor loads 1,600 newsletters into his truck from the printer when they are just hot off the press. He counts out 40 routes and prints up corresponding maps and bundles the papers with elastic bands. On his Virginia Way front porch, he stacks the bundles, leaving them for his stable of volunteers.

Once Victor emails the volunteers, they fan across the neighborhood's 91 street blocks. Some of the volunteers will visit 12 homes, while others deliver to as many as 70 homes.

Newspaper ink runs in his blood. He delivered the *Sacramento Union* as a kid, and as a high school student at Luther Burbank, he was a reporter and eventually editor-in-chief of the school paper. Later at UC Davis, he did layout and was later design director for *The California Aggie*. He appreciates the role of the *Hollywood Park Herald*. He says: "It gives the community an identity. I think our residents really like having something tangible to hold. I think we really like our little newsletter."

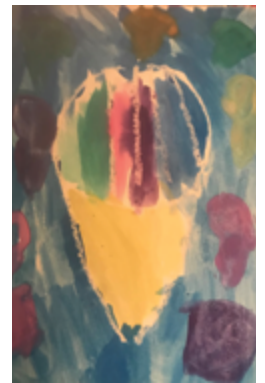
Victor started in this role while he was a HPNA board member. He served on the board for about three years between September 2015 until December 2018. During that time, he helped the organization cut newsletter printing costs almost in half by calling competing printers until he found MM Printing, where the newsletter is currently printed. Along with other board members, he helped develop HPNA's comments to the city planning commission on Raley's then proposed new development and worked with the designer who created the mid-century Hollywood Park public artwork at Freeport Blvd. and Stacia Way.

Victor's day job is with the California State Water Resources Control Board where he is a supervising engineer. He is also a father to a nine-year-old boy, with their two cats.
